
## Now after this is done you can be a frog and jump all around. For your trek has ended and your destination has been found!!

First, look to your left and find a hole. Through the fence you will go. Look to your right and find a trail. Follow it and look for something that was built to hold mail.

> Open it up and sign your name. Now you are ready to start the game.

Look to your left and find the wooden seat It's covered with two things that we think are quite neat Here are a few hints to see if you can guess each one's name The two are very similar, but they are most certainly not the same

The first one is green and squishy to feel It's a short, little plant but a very big deal It has tiny stems and very shallow roots It looks like a carpet and tickles the bellies of salamanders and newts! Are you ready to guess or are you at a loss? The first thing you are looking for is what we call moss!!

The second one comes in many different colors So many different kinds, making them unlike any other If you are here in winter, they may not be here Remember to look for them in the warmer months of the year Neither plant nor animal, but in a kingdom of their own You've probably seen them in your very own home Mushrooms and molds to name a few Come in all shapes and sizes, so enjoy the view They love to recycle nutrients back into the system But take my advice and do not try to eat them They sit around and feed on things as they die To clean up the forest, where they are known as fun-gi!!

Before you move on down the trail There is one more thing to see before you bail Just behind the wooden seat, There stands a honey locust tree with bark so neat. It's the one that looks just like its peeling Reach out and touch it, those high ridges are definitely worth feeling As you move on up the trail, to your left you will find. A big northern red oak tree standing so sublime. How do you know which one we are talking about? There is one big thing that will leave little doubt. Look closely at its feet and you will see A huge, unusual thing growing at the base of this tree It's a great big knot, known as a burl The hole in it provides shelter and storage for a chipmunk or a squirrel

Now continue on, but please make like a bobcat and sneak. For in the spring or summer you might get a peek. Of a frog as it leaps or a salamander as it swims along. In this pond that they both call their home. A little advice if you want to see a frog leap Try and stay quiet, not even a peep As you get closer, slow down to a creep. All along the edges they sit If you hear a belly flop, you know this is it!

The pond is full of life no matter the season So let's go through all four and find out the reason. Undoubtedly spring is the best time to see Baby tadpoles and insects that are called larvae. But the best of the best, better than any other Is to be here anytime during the summer. Listen close and you just might hear A chorus of frogs singing at this time of year! But soon they begin to wriggle to the shallow bottom Where they take a long nap beginning in autumn

During the winter the pond may be frozen But down in the mud the frogs are comfy and dozing.
